The group normally meets on the third Saturday of the month at 2:00 p.m. We’re following the Jay Finley Christ four-letter abbreviations of the tales in alphabetic order. Thus, we will take on ILLU May 18 and will take our non-Canonical detour June 15 with “The Little Old Man of Batignolles” by Émile Gaboriau. The story features the detective, Monsieur Lecoq, who is employed by the French Sûreté. The character is one of the pioneers of the genre and a major influence on Sherlock Holmes (who, in “A Study in Scarlet,” calls him “a miserable bungler”), laying the groundwork for the methodical, scientifically minded Holmes.

Though not Sherlockian, **Ruth Berman** has a book out from Black Coat Press. “The Tales of King Cambrinus,” is a translation of French author Charles Deulin's fairy tales from both of his two collections, “Tales of a Beer Drinker” as well as “Tales of King Cambrinus.” Also a fairy tale, “Pipette's Paradise,” from, “Small Town Stories,” Deulin's collection of mostly non-fantasy stories. Deulin's work is little known in English (some of his stories were included – somewhat abridged – in Andrew Lang's Color Fairy Books), but he has a wry, dry humor that I find very attractive. Steve Schier will lead the group in a discussion of “A Case of Identity.” via a Zoom gathering. See discussion questions below.

1. How could Mary Sutherland be fooled by her stepfather’s disguise?
2. Why didn’t Holmes tell her the truth about Hosmer Angel? What do you make of his deductions and behavior in this case?
3. Would the Windibank/Sutherland household have been headed for rough waters even without young Mary’s inheritance from her Uncle Ned? What else was going on in that family?
4. Was Windibank secretly (or openly) attracted to Mary all along? If so, then why didn’t he marry her in the first place, instead of her mother?
5. An abusive husband will sometimes choose to torment his spouse through her children. Was Windibank’s Hosmer Angel scheme part of his on-going abuse of both women? Did Mary’s mother go along with the “joke” because she was afraid?
6. Was Windibank merely a greedy and selfish fool, a man who concocted what seemed (to him) a harmless way to keep Mary and her income at home for a bit longer? Did Windibank's own scheme run away with him?
7. Do you think Holmes was right or wrong in his assessment of Windibank as a felon in the making? Do you think his contact with Holmes frightened him into better behavior?
8. Where does Windibank rank among the villains Holmes encountered? Formidable or not so formidable?
9. What is your view of the quality of this mystery and its ranking among the 56 stories in the canon?
