Study Group Discussion Questions:

Mary Loving will lead the group in a discussion of "The Adventure of the Musgrave Ritual" via a Zoom gathering. See discussion questions below.

- 1. This story gives us quite a description of the rooms at 221B. If you were able to visit, not knowing who lived there, what would you be able to deduce about the occupants just from the state of the flat?
- 2. How many bullets does it take to outline a VR on the wall? And what do you think Mrs. Hudson's reaction was when she saw/heard it?
- 3. The Blanched Soldier and The Lions Mane are also cases told by Holmes, but they are not nearly as compelling as this one. What is the difference here? Is it because while Holmes wrote the latter two stories himself, Watson put down the narrative for MUSG as given by Holmes? Is it possible Watson "embellished" some of the facts to make the story more interesting?
- 4. Holmes says that at school, Musgrave "more than once... expressed a keen interest in my methods." Does that strike you as odd for a man of Musgrave's station in life? But what was Musgrave really like? Was he a basically decent man?
- 5. What does Reginald Musgrave mean when he calls Brunton a "Don Juan"? How does this behavior affect what happens to Brunton in the end?
- 6. How does Holmes manage to solve/perform the Musgrave ritual, despite being hung up a few times? Don't trees grow taller in 200 years?
- 7. What was the cause of Brunton's death? The butler's body was discovered about a week after he disappeared. Holmes seems to have believed that Brunton suffocated, but did a postmortem confirm this? Was the chamber airtight when the stone was in place?
- 8. Why did "some months" elapse between Brunton's question about the elm tree and his descent into the treasure chamber? Did it take him that long to figure out the rest of the Ritual? Did it take him that long to patch things up with Rachel Howells?
- 9. Why were the county police summoned by Holmes prior to raising the stone? Holmes said that he expected to find all the answers to the mystery once the stone was lifted and the body discovered, and he was disappointed when that did not prove to be the case. Did Holmes suspect Musgrave at any time? Was Holmes completely satisfied with his logically deduced solution to the case?
- 10. Two days after Brunton's disappearance, Rachel Howells silently slipped out of her sick bed and vanished. Her footprints were found leading up to the edge of a nearby lake but dragging failed to produce her body. What do you think happened to her?
- 11. What is Reginald Musgrave's connection to Charles the Second?
- 12. How did the crown of the Stuarts, placed in a box and undisturbed for 200-odd years, become bent and twisted out of its original shape? Even the damaged Beryl Coronet still looked crown-like, but the description of the Stuart crown bears no resemblance to anything a king might have worn.
