Conferences, Meetings, and Gatherings:

The Torists International S.S. will hold their Summer 2025 meeting on June 28, 2025. Our own Erica Fair will be the featured speaker on the topic of medicine in the Canon. Christmas Annual - Call for Papers - September 5 Submission Deadline - "Holmes in Motion"

Ray Riethmeier and Phil Bergem are once again compiling and editing the Norwegian Explorers Christmas Annual and are requesting content for inclusion in this year's publication. It is distributed each year to attendees of the Norwegian Explorers Annual Dinner in December, and additional copies are made available to interested Sherlockians around the world.

This year's theme will be "Holmes in Motion." Transportation plays a significant role in the Sherlock Holmes stories. Travel by train to adventures away from London is an iconic scene for our heroes, as are rides in hansom cabs, or going out for a stroll. The stories also involve a fair number of ships, bicycles, and even the Underground, which — though seldom mentioned — was readily available. Another way we find Holmes in motion is through performance, be it on stage, television, or motion pictures. The Christmas Annual for this year will explore a wide avenue of possible topics derived from locomotion in the sixty Canonical tales, or presentations on stage and screen. We are looking for articles, pastiches, poems, puzzles, or artwork exploring anything from a specific way Holmes or Watson may have travelled, something about transportation in the Victorian era in general, or the way we remember the characters from performances over the years. However Holmes manages to move us, we want you to share it!

"Watson," premiered January 26 on ABC. The series' events take place six months after the death of the titular character's friend and partner Sherlock Holmes at the hands of Moriarty. The show stars Morris Chestnut as Dr. John Watson, who resumes his medical career as the head of a clinic dedicated to treating rare disorders. Watson's old life isn't done with him, though - Moriarty and Watson are set to write their own chapter of a story that has fascinated audiences for more than a century. Watson is a medical show with a strong investigative spine, featuring a modern version of one of history's greatest detectives as he turns his attention from solving crimes to solving medical mysteries.

Study Group Discussion Questions:

Mary Loving will lead the group in a discussion of two noncanonical stories by Arthur Conan Doyle: "The Black Doctor" and "The Jew's Breastplate" via a Zoom gathering. See discussion questions below.

The Black Doctor

- 1. The secret or surprise twin is a common soap opera trope. Was Conan Doyle the first to use it in a mystery?
- 2. Why did Dr. Lana give up so easily after he received the letter from Ernest? He had established his career, was well regarded by his neighbors and patients, and was about to get married. Why did he feel he had no defense against whatever trouble his brother might cause?
- 3. According to Dr. Lana's testimony, Ernest brought on his own death through agitation to the point where his diseased heart gave out. The bruises were allegedly caused by Ernest getting into a fight earlier that day. Do we accept that as the truth or is it just a convenient explanation? After all, Lana had to escape to England due to his brother's horrible treatment of him. Ernest's appearance in England was upending Lana's peaceful life and plans. Would we think less of him had he decided to take matters into his own hands?
- 4. Lana testified he didn't think anyone would assume he had been murdered, despite the fact he had swapped clothes with dead Ernest. Isn't that a bit naive?
- 5. Although Ernest, by his death, still managed to create a scandal for Lana and put Arthur Morton in jeopardy, in the end Lana kept his reputation and his bride. Do we agree that is a fit ending to this tale?
- 6. Imagine this story had been written as part of the Holmesian Canon. Would this mystery have been a fit one for Holmes to investigate? How would we rearrange the plot if Arthur Morton had become Holmes' client?
- 7. Conan Doyle published this during his own hiatus between "The Final Problem" and "The Hound of the Baskervilles." Do we think this might have been a story he originally planned for Holmes?

The Jew's Breastplate

- 1. How would an artifact with such religious importance as the ancient breastplate of the Jewish high priest end up in an English museum that is not the British Museum (other than the usual colonialist looting)?
- 2. With such valuable collections, why does the Belmore only have one night watchman who makes his rounds only once every three hours? The watchman said he made four rounds the night the breastplate was first tampered with. How long is his shift?
- 3. Mortimer and Jackson easily deduce the note warning about the security of the collection has the same handwriting as that of Professor Andreas. Why did Andreas not just sign the note instead of trying to be anonymous?
- 4. Instead of risking capture by taking the time to try to pry out the gemstones, why didn't the thief just take the whole plate? Surely the gold mounting is also valuable, and they could then pry out the stones in the privacy of their own space. Why did the thief give up, especially considering the watchman saw and heard nothing?

- 5. How many times in movies have we seen someone use a hidden doorway disguised as a mummy case? Could it be this now cliched spooky entrance idea was invented by Conan Doyle?
- 6. From their hiding place over the museum's hall, Mortimer and Jackson watch in shock and outrage while Andreas desecrates the Jewish relic. After hearing Andreas' explanation, why didn't he just take them into his confidence in the first place?
- 7. Speaking of Andreas' explanation, why did he ever think it was a good idea to give his future son-in-law unescorted free access to such valuable collections? Was this a common behavior of museum curators at the time? Once he realized Wilson's true motives, why didn't Andreas involve the police? Or contact a consulting detective? Do we believe Wilson is truly repentant and redeemable?
- 8. Since Andreas had to restore the real stones to the damaged breastplate in stages why, after the first discovery of tampering, did the diamond expert not notice that only the first row of stones were genuine?
- 9. Speaking of consulting detectives, do you think this story would have made a good Holmes story? Playwright Edith Meiser seemed to think so as she wrote a 1934 radio-play titled, "The Jewish Breastplate," for which the manuscript is included as part of the papers she donated to the Sherlock Holmes Collections at the University of Minnesota.
